- Heads a Friday Volunteer Group at the Herman Brown Free Library, whose members index and archive documents and photos for the library's files, and answer genealogical queries from researchers.

- Until 2007, served as a member of the Burnet County Library Board and representative to Central Texas Library System for Herman Brown Free Library. Currently a member of Friends of Herman Brown Free Library's Executive Board of Directors; serving as Treasurer.

- First computer tutor at Herman Brown Free Library, teaching library patrons basic computer skills for Internet and word processing. (1998-2005)

While not a native to Burnet, she has ancestral ties to the county. I want to begin by thanking everyone for taking time out of their busy schedules to attend our program.

This program is our version of the popular TV series..."Who do You Think You Are?", which premiered on NBC in 2010 and was picked up by TLC in 2012. The newest season began on TLC in March 2017.



Just like the TV show, our home town celebrities are the focus of a genealogy show and tell. The Burnet County Genealogical Society has researched two separate home town celebrities.

Today we're going to explore the ancestry of a couple of Burnet's long-time citizens. For this large audience, and its presence on the internet for future programs, we've hidden their names to respect and protect their privacy.

That can be Lesson #1: You should NEVER put information about living persons (birthdate, place, names of underage children, addresses, place of employment, etc.) on genealogy-type websites. The risk of identity theft or other fraud is too high. Websites like Ancestry.com will automatically block dates of "living" persons. Others do not. Be careful.

This program will be partly "how-to" and partly "this is what we found".


# Getting Started

- · Start with Yourself
- Gather as much information as you can about immediate family
  - Mother, Father, and their siblings
- Collect photos when possible

So, let's get started!

# With a genealogy project, it's best to

- 1. Start with yourself
- 2. Gather information from living relatives
- Collect photos and documents such as certificates, military discharge, birth, marriage and death.
- 4. Document findings on each family on a PEDIGREE CHART AND THEN ON FAMILY GROUP SHEET.



If you use these forms from the very beginning, your research will be organized, and you will be able to tell at a glance where to focus to find the next clue. These can be on paper or from a computer program.

Be sure to add the source of each and every fact you find...

Because sometimes, "facts" turn out to be wrong...



So, here we go...

These are some of the family photos collected from T. and B.. Make sure to get correct names and dates.

Don't just put "Mom" and "Dad"

The next slide will explain why...



We got names and dates for all except one...

(read off names and dates)

And then this wonderful photo taken at their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary. On the back is:


"Mother, Me, T.'s Mother, T."

Luckily, we could go back to family to find out who "Mother" was. But, I have a boxful of photos like this and no one to ask. Go through your photos and label with names and dates!



Documents, like this City of Burnet Proclamation, 2014, can give valuable insight to the life of the person you're researching.


Websites like Ancestry or Family Search have wills, stories, old family histories, and photos. Collect them as clues.



This photo of the A. J. C. family (T.'s grandparents) had names of all written on the back.

The second picture (B.'s grandparents) also had names: - D. S. and M. S. C.


There were no dates. But, we can estimate dates by clothing and by the children's approximate ages.



When you start researching, remember to use family group sheets to record all info you find.

For the purpose of this presentation, we're using a computer-generated pedigree chart.


We're starting with T. and B. ...Generation 1



From photos and documents you've gathered, start filling in the information found on the pedigree chart and the family group sheets.


If you don't have info for part of the form, just leave it blank, and go on.

The blanks will show you where to focus your research later.




From a photo we learned that T. always gave the first haircuts free. Here's a toddler receiving his first.

T. was a member of the Burnet Volunteer Fire Department for a number of years.




This picture doesn't give any new facts, but it's a nice addition to the family story, because it shows what they looked like at a certain time in their lives.



After gathering what you can easily find out, add children and their families.


Pictures can be added to computer generated forms to add interest.

This slide shows a more complete Pedigree Chart for Generation 1.



Then begin to work back thru each generation.

This picture was identified as about 1945 because of the clothing and ages of the two brothers.




This is a portion of our "Pedigree Chart", showing T with his parents and B with her parents.


At this point, we've entered everything on our charts that the family knew.

Find a grave - free Burnet TXGenWeb - free Family Search - free Ancestry



In newspapers, look for obituaries. Here's the obituary found for T.'s mother, A. C. H..

There's quite a bit of info from just this one document. Date and place of birth/death. Names of parents. Living and deceased family members. Burial site.


Add the information found here to the pedigree and family group sheets.

Continue searching for documents, vital records, etc.

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Death Certificate. This is considered a vital record and a primary source. It's an official document required by the state. Texas death certificates can be found on familysearch.org.

But, be careful. Not all info is necessarily correct. It depends on who is telling the state or county official what the "facts" are. Some admit that they don't know, others guess and further research will show discrepancies. It's up to you to find enough documents that match each other before deciding if it's a fact.



Another Death Certificate and vital record – B's mother.

This gives additional information that we didn't have before.

Add to pedigree chart and family group sheet.


## **Check Census Records**

- www.familysearch.org (free) OR ancestry.com
- Look for each census when this family was living, then
- · Look for each census for their parents' lifetime
- Start with the latest census (1940) and work back
  - 1940 shows R. and A. operating a business in Burnet; 60 hours per week
  - R.C. Was 13; T. was 10

Another information source are census records. ALWAYS check census records for your family members.

Check for them with parents when they were children. Check for them when they were adults. Different census years will reveal different clues: where they lived, where they were born, where parents were born, when they married, if naturalized citizen and when immigrated; level of education, whether they owned or rented homes or farms, occupation, if in military service and more.

Census records are federal documents and exist for every 10 years since the founding of our country. The latest census available to the public is 1940. In 1940, R. and A. operated a business and worked 60 hours per week. Son R.C. Was 13; T. was 10.



The 1930 census gives a little bit more info. It shows the family and where they lived in Coryell County, Texas. Mother and father were age 24, son RC was 2 and T was 11 months old.

1930 is as far back with census records as we can go for T's parents, because at this point we don't know who THEIR parents were.

After we explore all census records, what's next?

Birth records.



This is another example of a primary source: a birth certificate.

From R.'s birth certificate we were able to confirm his father's name and also to learn his mother's maiden name.

We also now have the address of his parents and his father's occupation.


We added this new info to our family group sheet and noted the source.



Now we're ready to go on to Generation 3: T's Grandparents.

For the first 2 generations, we were able to get most information from living people.

But as we go back in time, we had to gather information from other sources, such as birth and death records, and censuses.




A good website to find death and burial records is FindaGrave.com. This slide shows the tombstone for T's grandmother, S.E.E.H.

It's a website that volunteers upload information and photos of cemetery and death data.

Often, family information or obituaries are added. The contributor's name is shown and the date. The contributor for this page was John C. In 2004. Follow links on that site to find other family members.

Caution: Always confirm data from internet sites like Find A Grave with other sources like birth certificates, social security death index, wills, etc.



This is a 2<sup>nd</sup> page for T. and S. (E.) H. which was uploaded by a different contributor, Joe in 2010. It has different links to family members.

The census can provide clues to the family after T. died.



Because the tombstone for T. on the previous slide showed him dying before his wife, we looked for S.E.H. On census records after the date of husband's death.

Couldn't find her on 1920 census.

1930 census showed her living in Burnet County with son in law's family. More names to add to our charts.

1940 census, living with father, J. D. E.




We found that the death certificate for wife, S. (S. E.) H. which gives us hints of where to look further or confirms previous information. (her parents names; where buried, cause of death)

Remember, Familysearch.org has Texas death certificates, and it's free.

Don't forget look for an obituary...it gives a lot of family info



Keep going back to the census records.

For T., we found him in 1900 and 1910, showing this info: parents and children and their ages.

Further confirming that he was the father of R. H.




While on Find A Grave, we found links to extended family info and pictures.

Contact these family members for information, photos, stories, and reunions.




We're now at Generation 4 – great grandparents

So, on to the census records!



# Census records from 1850 to 1880 -show progression of family, locations lived, occupations, others living in the family


- 1850, age 30 in Bibb County, Alabama with Elizabeth J., age 22; William, age 11860, age 40 in Cherokee County, Texas; with Elizabeth and 6 children listed; T. J. age 6/12
- 1870, Eliz H. living in Caldwell County in the household of George H., age 25 with children: Robert, age 19; Pleasant, age 16; Joseph, age 13; Anne E. age 12; and Jackson age 10
- In 1880, she was still in Caldwell County but was listed as widowed mother-inlaw and living with George P., age 25 and his wife Ann, age 22; Two P. children Lillie, age 3 and Thomas, age 1.



Always try to find military records.

They're some of the most reliable for facts.

And we found CSA service records for both David and his brother, Albert Sidney



Try to find actual service records. Some places to look:





Most large libraries have internet presence to search their collections



While looking for the earliest census for David H. (1840) we found his father, William H., in a family of 7 free white persons, living in Bibb County Alabama, and a total of 8 slaves.


The 1850 census of Bibb County found William age 73, b. about 17\_\_ in Virginia and Martha, age 60, and Albert S., age 24. David and wife Elizabeth were next door with William age 1.

What's the first thing we go to for info on an individual born in early 1800s?

Census, because most states did not require birth record-keeping at any level until later. Churches kept marriage and birth records.




# The further back we go, the harder it is to find solid information.

More can probably be found on this family by searching state records for wills, deeds, and other family trees.

We found on another family tree that this William Hullum was the son of William H., born in 1750, and married to Ann B, both born in Virginia. But at this point, we don't know if that's true or not.


Be careful when looking at resources like compiled family trees that do not have sources named. Consider them only as clues. Find a source for every fact claimed.



We think further research will lead to possible Revolutionary War ancestors...
Since both were born at the right time in the 1700s.


But that's another story!

The next slides will show a family chart for T. and then for B. that puts all this information into a manageable form. And the blanks show research that still needs to be done.



Here's T's Pedigree Chart. You can see the progress we've made since the beginning research process.

And the blanks that still need to be filled.



B.'s Pedigree Chart so far. She's descended from Burnet pioneer families of S. and C. There are CSA veterans in both families.

We're still looking at Burnet's Pioneer J. family for connections.



And that concludes our presentation...but first,

I'd like to thank T. and his family for agreeing to be the subject of our research program, His immediate family, for supplying family info and photos

And Maud Cain, Burnet County Genealogical Society member, for her relentless research in preparation for the original presentation.

All the H. info you saw here today, except for what came from the family, was found in Burnet's library, using the Dobie Research Room books and microfilmed newspapers and the library's internet access, all provided at no charge to library patrons.

The library is funded in part by city and county tax dollars, without which there would be no history research. So, thanks are in order to the taxpayers' funding for the library, too! An expansion of our research room will be completed this year, with more equipment and reference books. The friends of the library and the genealogy society buy all books and equipment for the Dobie Room and have volunteered over 630 hours this past year to assist with research. If you have time, please visit the Dobie Room and see the fine collection we have there.

#### Start With Yourself

- > Prepare Pedigree Chart and Family Group Record with information YOU know
  - Family Group Record: One for each couple on Pedigree Chart and one for each marriage
- Record the source of each new piece of information that you learn about an ancestor

#### Decide What You Need to Learn

- > Research the BLANK spots on your chart Focus on one ancestor at a time
- Then, choose and focus on one objective at a time about a life event or background topic

#### Choose a Source of Information

- Person Interview Living Relatives Or others who may have known person you're researching
- Gravestone
- > Photos
- Old homes, memorials, etc.
- **➢** Bible
- Birth, death, marriage record
- > Census
- Military record

#### \* As your find information...

- > Fill in blanks on Pedigree Chart and Family Group Records
- Determine what research is needed for remaining blanks

#### Research

- > Use a Research Log

#### **❖** Organize Your Papers Early

#### Paper

File pedigree charts and family group sheets in 3-ring binders by surname

File original documents (birth, death, marriage) and correspondence in separate folders

Make an index of contents of each folder as you acquire documents; mark each paper with a number (St-1, St-2, etc) As your research expands, add new binders and folders

If you do this when you first begin, you won't become overwhelmed as your paper pile begins to grow

#### Computer

- > Buy Genealogy software and enter husband and wife, children, siblings, grandparents, etc. The software will organize your data and various reports can be printed.
- Be sure to print pedigree charts and family group sheets, along with photos, and documents gathered and organize for safekeeping. Computer software changes, becomes obsolete; computers die. You need a print copy of everything!


